### The Need

Nearly **one billion** people worldwide struggle with a mental health condition.

One in seven of the world's adolescents live with a mental health disorder each year.

During the first year of the pandemic, anxiety and depression rose by 25% worldwide.

44% of youth reported they were distressed or struggling in 2021. - Mental State of the World Report 2021

# NATIONWIDE The Need

"The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP) and the Children's Hospital Association (CHA) are joining together to declare a National State of Emergency in Children's Mental Health."

"One in three high school students and half of female students reported persistent feelings of **sadness or hopelessness**, an overall increase of 40% from 2009."

## The Need

When it comes to mental health, California has earned a D+.

Between 2009 and 2018, incidents of youth self-harm increased 50%.

66% of students surveyed said the pandemic has affected their mental health.

Students rating their mental wellness at 7 or higher out of 10 dropped from 68% to 39% during the pandemic.

"The pandemic has taken a **clear** and **significant toll** on students' mental health."


7 in 10 public schools are seeing a rise in the number of students seeking mental health care.


76% said faculty and staff members have expressed concerns about depression, anxiety and trauma in students since the pandemic hit.

Only about half of all schools said they were able to effectively provide needed services.

Staff are hurting as well as students. 6 in 10 schools reported a rise in staffers' concern over their own or their colleagues' mental health.

### **QUALITY STAFF**


Our licensed professional therapists and mental health clinicians are held to the highest standards. We provide referrals as needed, helping families navigate overwhelming, unfamiliar terrain.

NUMU and CASSY worked together during the 2021-2022 year to provide art therapy services to school aged students. NUMU and CASSY collaborated on curricula aimed toward helping youth cope with trauma during the pandemic. The goal was to create self-reflective art experiences and opportunities while using creativity as a vehicle for catharsis. Our collaboration culminated in an "Art with Heart" virtual toolkit that connects youth and families to CASSY's resources on NUMU's website, while centering art making and creative expression as a meaningful practice.

#### **IMPACT**

The need for therapeutic support for NUMU's students was evident, and CASSY was able to provide resources for NUMU's art program students.

According to Michèle Jubilee, "Through our relationship with CASSY, our program development was enhanced, resulting in enriched content and a more impactful connection with our audience. The art therapy-inspired reflection components elevated our audience's engagement, resulting in more meaningful artwork."

"Our summer camp students left camp feeling empowered, 'happy,' and 'calm,'" she added. We will continue to include art therapy-inspired reflection questions in our programs for youth to help them reflect on how art makes them feel, how their art can make others feel, and most importantly, how art can communicate deep and meaningful messages."




